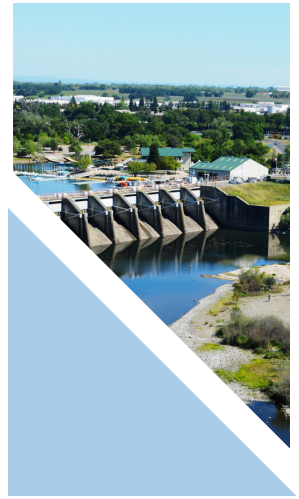

# Medication-Assisted Treatment for Opioid Use Disorder

Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) is the use of FDA-approved medications, in combination with counseling and behavioral therapies, to provide a “whole-patient” approach to the treatment of substance use disorders.

## METHADONE

Clinic-based opioid agonist that does not block other narcotics while preventing withdrawal while taking it; daily liquid dispensed only in specialty regulated clinics. Methadone tricks the brain into thinking it's still getting the abused drug. In fact, the person is not getting high from it and feels normal, so withdrawal does not occur.

- Common brands: Methadose, Diskets, Dolophine

## NALTREXONE

Office-based non-addictive opioid antagonist that blocks the effects of other narcotics; daily pill or monthly injection. Naltrexone works differently than methadone and buprenorphine in the treatment of opioid dependency. If a person using naltrexone relapses and uses the abused drug, naltrexone blocks the euphoric and sedative effects of the abused drug and prevents feelings of euphoria.

- Common brands: Revia, Vivitrol

## BUPRENORPHINE/ NALOXONE & BUPRENORPHINE

Office-based opioid agonist/antagonist that blocks other narcotics while reducing withdrawal risk; daily dissolving tablet, cheek film, or 6-month implant under the skin. Like methadone, buprenorphine suppresses and reduces cravings for the abused drug.

- Common brands: Suboxone, Zubsolv, Bunavail, Subutex, Probuphine, Sublocade

## NALOXONE

A medication used to prevent overdose by opioids such as heroin, morphine, and oxycodone. It blocks opioid receptor sites, reversing the toxic effects of the overdose. Naloxone is administered when a patient is showing signs of opioid overdose. The medication can be given by intranasal spray, intramuscular (into the muscle), subcutaneous (under the skin), or intravenous injection.

- Common brands: Narcan, Evzio

\*Naloxone offered to all beneficiaries as a form of overdose prevention
