Greg Garcia, Youth Engagement Director from CitiesRISE; Olivia Ang- Olsen from CitiesRISE; Frances Kassouni from CitiesRISE; Chalea Wright from IQ Squad; Alana Ramsay from IQ Squad; Amaryana Crutchfield from Impact Sac; and Dream Goodson from Impact Sac provided a presentation from the perspective of youth on the CitiesRISE Report as well as Youth Realities in Sacramento During COVID-19.	
IX.	Division of Behavioral Health Services	<ul> <li>Dr. Ryan Quist, Behavioral Health Director, provided a written report on the status of Behavioral Health Services. He also provided verbal updates and answered questions as follows:</li> <li>On Thursday of last week, the Criminal Justice INN project was approved by the Mental Health Services Oversight and Accountability Commission. Stakeholder and community feedback was included in the plan. The next step is to seek approval from the Board of Supervisors.</li> <li>Cases of COVID-19 continue to increase in Sacramento County. Many of these cases are due to families from different households meeting indoors without masks. Please remember</li> </ul>	

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	<ul> <li>to take care of yourselves, your family, and your friends in order to stay safe.</li> <li>Safety precautions are in place for when behavioral health services need to be provided in person, such as staggered appointments, Plexiglas to keep people separated, hand sanitizer, and masks.</li> <li>The number of youth seeking behavioral health services has decreased. BHS has taken steps to get the word out that these services remain available during the COVID-19 pandemic.</li> <li>BHS has sponsored four Safe Black Space healing circles, each of which had capacity for over 100 people. Feedback has been received from the African American/Black Community that they would be more comfortable utilizing behavioral health services if more service providers looked like them.</li> <li>The Source phone line is 24/7 to provide warmline requests for community members to talk about behavioral health challenges.</li> </ul>	
X. Public Comment	<ul> <li>Public Comment 1: Community member discussed the intersectionality between school crises, trauma informed staff, administrative staff, and emergency procedures. Community member advocated for allocating funds to help students navigate and get linked to mental health resources.</li> <li>Public Comment 2: Community member advocated for the hiring of more mental health professionals in schools.</li> </ul>
