



From the Clan Lab Capital to the Largest Importer

- Formerly, California and particularly the Central Valley dominated meth production.
- Clandestine
 precursor-based labs
 – the largest
 designated as "super labs" were abundant.
- Dismantling these toxic labs was dangerous work, requiring careful decontamination.
- Now, meth is produced in Mexico and smuggled into the U.S.

Meth Conversion Labs

- Central Valley HIDTA investigators routinely encounter meth conversion labs, where liquid meth smuggled from Mexico is converted to crystal meth (ice).
- A HIDTA team raided this lab in process: 260 pounds of ice were already finished, and the remaining 250 gallons of liquid could yield as much as 1,100 more pounds of finished meth.



Meth – Where does it come from, and how does it get here?

Methamphetamine is produced in cartel-controlled clandestine labs in Mexico, then smuggled into the U.S., mostly through ports of entry along the SWB.

The Role of the Southwest Border

- 97 % of meth seizures occur at, or near, the SWB in 2017.
- More than half (54%) of those seizures occurred within the San Diego Corridor.

 the heightened
 threat of meth
 to California.

The Challenge of Liquid Meth

- In order to avoid detection at ports of entry, Mexican meth traffickers smuggle liquid meth mixed in gasoline or disguised as household products.
- Once in the U.S., heat sources and/or chemicals are used to recover the crystal meth.







Who Controls Meth Trafficking?


- Domestic wholesale distribution of meth is controlled by Mexican drug trafficking organizations (DTOs). Mexican and U.S.-based criminal groups are responsible for retail meth distribution in the U.S.
- Regional investigative activity follows this pattern.






How Much Meth is seized regionally?

- Central Valley
 HIDTA task forces
 seize more meth by
 volume than any
 other drug
 (excluding
 marijuana).
- Meth seizures have increased over the last three years. When considered with the morbidity, mortality, and treatment data, this is an ominous trend.







How Much Does Meth Cost?

- Meth is widely available and dirt cheap.
- Ten years ago, a pound of crystal meth (ice) cost as much as \$15,000.
- Today, undercover negotiations for ice as low as \$1,400 per pound are common in the region.



Sobering Numbers

- Meth-related fatal drug poisonings have been steadily increasing in California a 237% rise in eight years.
- The 2017 total for meth-related overdoses rivals opioid-related deaths: 2,194.



More Sobering Numbers

Related negative health consequences are equally troubling: numbers of methrelated E.D. visits and hospital admissions are consistently high year-to-year.



In the 12 counties comprising the Central Valley HIDTA, meth is the drug most often identified by patients admitted to drug abuse treatment programs.



The Regional Challenge of Drug Trafficking and Abuse

- Meth is not the only drug threat in California.
- HIDTA teams regularly seize opioids like heroin and fentanyl: the opioid epidemic is happening in our state.
- Public health data indicates more people are using and being harmed by cocaine.
- THC extraction labs continue to explode causing death and destruction and produce dangerously potent marijuana concentrates.
