SEXUAL HEALTH PROMOTION PROGRAM

Is comprised of...

HIV/STD Prevention

- HIV antibody testing
- Chlamydia and gonorrhea screening
- Hepatitis C prevention and screening
- Outreach activities / Technical assistance, Training / Professional Development
- Community involvement through the HIV Health Services Planning Council and the Sacramento Workgroup to Improve Sexual Health (SacWISH)
- County-wide HIV prevention activities
- Social marketing campaigns
- STD prevention and information

HIV/STD Surveillance

- Charged with STD prevention and control activities including:
 - follow-up on reportable diseases such as Syphilis and HIV
 - Partner notification
 - Investigations / verification of treatment performed by Communicable Disease Investigators (CDI)
 - Coordination of outbreak response with state or county

Ryan White CARE Program

- Oversees the administration of Federal dollars to maintain a comprehensive continuum of HIV care and treatment services for people living with HIV/AIDS
- Includes Sacramento, El Dorado, and Placer Counties





WHAT IS AN STD/STI?


- Sexually
- **Transmitted**
- Disease/Infection





TRANSMISSION

- Intimate sexual contact:
 - Oral Sex
 - Anal Sex
 - Vaginal Sex
- From infected fluids or skin-to-skin contact with infected tissue







SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS IN CA

2017 State CDPH Data

Chlamydia

- 218,728 chlamydia cases reported in 2017 was the highest number since reporting began in 1990
- 2017 Rate of chlamydia was 552.2 cases per 100,000 Californians – representing a 9% increase over 2016
- More than half (54%) of cases were among people under age 25

Gonorrhea

- 75,372 gonorrhea cases reported in 2017 was the highest number since 1988
- 2017 Rate of gonorrhea was 190.3 cases per 100,000 Californians – representing a 16% increase over 2016
- 33% od cases were among people under age 25

Syphilis

- 13,719 syphilis cases reported in 2017 was the highest number since 1987
- 2017 Rate of syphilis was 34.6 cases per 100,000 Californians – representing a 21% increase over 2016
- Female cases increased over 600% from less than 249 cases reported in 2012


- Chlamydia 8th (2017)

THE INTERSECTION OF SUBSTANCE USE AND SEXUAL HEALTH

Strong Association between Meth users and diagnosis with an STI:

- Prolonged sexual stimulation
- Decreased inhibition
- Increased libido
- Skin abrasion from prolonged contact (friction) during sex
- Results in higher risk of transmission



Association between Meth and STDs


- SF MSM STD clinic study Meth users (vs. non-users) Mitchell et al, 2004; Wong et al, 2005
 - had twice as many partners in the prior 4 weeks
 - were 1.7 times more likely to have gonorrhea
 - were 1.9 times more likely to have <u>chlamydia</u>
 - were 4.9 times more likely to have syphilis
- STD case interview data for early syphilis in various locations around the country --
 - Increases in proportion of syphilis cases reporting recent meth use (e.g, California)








Methamphetamine use and Syphilis cases in Sacramento County- State Data

HIV

Viral Suppression

- Key strategy in reducing new HIV infections is to maintain viral suppression (meaning a low viral load) among individuals who are HIV+
- An Undetectable viral load manes the virus is untransmutable through sexual contact (U=U)


