Approved by the Federal court in early January.</li> <li>Staffing shortage (providers and nursing) is extremely challenging and it is impacting our access as well as initiatives.</li> <li>Began provision of discharge medication in late December. Initially for sentenced adults with Serious Mental Illness (SMI) and in mid-January to entire sentenced population. This is a complex process and we are still working on overcoming operational challenges. Discharge planning is a multi-step process requiring additional resources. Mental health have been working on linkage to county mental health providers for the SMI population.</li> <li>Began Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) in late 2019. Providers trained on use of MAT for Alcohol Use Disorder and currently our Medical Director is working on MAT for Opioid Use Disorders. This initiative is focused on continuation medication. The provider shortage is impacting all work.</li> </ul>


